




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SESSION DEFINITIONS

Clinic: Performer(s) instructs/speaks about and demonstrates techniques/ideas.

Clinic/Performance: Same as the clinic, but containing a greater amount of structured performance (i.e., performance with group, tape, etc.).

Concert: Features artist(s) in a formal/semiformal concert performance.

Lab: Hands-on, interactive, instructional session.

Lecture/Paper Presentation: A formal, academic presentation of a research paper or topic.

Master Class: Attendees are called to the stage to receive personal instruction in front of the audience.

FUNdamentals: Hands on workshop that is geared towards student percussionists and their teachers, including private instructors and band directors.

Panel Discussion: A panel of experts on any given subject. Does not constitute featuring any particular artist in a clinic or feature setting.

Presentation: Academic presentation of a specific topic, i.e., industry seminar, posters.

Professional Development:

Workshop or lecture that is geared towards individuals aspiring to enhance their career paths.

Workshop: All attendees are invited to bring instruments and participate in this instructional session.

Westin First Floor



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



Following his onstage career with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, Akins became the ISO's Director of Public Relations and Director of Archives for another 16 years before his retirement. Away from music, Akins serves as a sports broadcaster for several national radio networks.

Gilú Amaral and Chris Nolasco ■ Friday, 11:00 A.M.

Gilú Amaral is one of the leading Brazilian percussionists of his generation. His vast musical experiences include composing for and performing with such groups and artists as Naná Vasconcelos, Renata Rosa, Bonsucesso Samba Clube, Ave Sangria, Academia da Berlinda,



and Banda de Pau e Corda. His most well known compositions were written for the Orquestra Contemporânea de Olinda and the instrumental group Wassab, both of which he founded. Amaral grew up surrounded by music in his hometown of Olinda in the Northeastern part of Brazil. From an early age, he participated in and learned the rhythmical structures of the Afro-Brazilian religion of Candomblé.

John R. Beck ■ Thursday, 4:00 P.M.

John R. Beck is the Professor of Percussion Studies at the University of North Carolina School of the Arts and also teaches percussion and Afro-Cuban drumming at Wake Forest University. Beck's interest in the intersection of the arts and medicine began while he was PAS President through visits with music therapists at the Riley Hospital for Children in Indianapolis. He



facilitates weekly group drumming for the Pediatric Behavioral Health and Cancer Patient Support Programs at Wake Forest Baptist Medical

Center, Senior Services, and the YWCA. He is currently involved in a research project with stem cell transplant recipients using drumming to reduce anxiety and improve the hospital experience. Beck performs with the Winston-Salem and Greensboro, North Carolina Symphony Orchestras and holds degrees from Oberlin College and the Eastman School of Music.

Bob Becker ■ Saturday, 11:00 A.M.

Bob Becker's performing experience spans nearly all of the musical disciplines where percussion is found. Generally considered to be one of the world's premier virtuoso performers on the xylophone and marimba, he also appears regularly as an independent soloist and clinician. In particular, his work toward resurrecting the repertoire and performance styles of early 20th century xylophone music has been recognized



internationally. Becker has been associated with the Malletech company since 1988, and plays the Malletech ragtime/soloist xylophone, which he helped design. He uses the Bob Becker signature line of Malletech mallets. He is also an endorser and designer for the Sabian cymbal company, and was honored with Sabian's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2005. In 2006, he was recognized as a Master Drummer by the International Association of Traditional Drummers. In 1999, he was inducted, as a member of the percussion group, NEXUS, into the PAS Hall of Fame.

Dr. T. Adam Blackstock currently serves as Associate Professor of Percussion Studies at Troy University and Principal Timpanist with the Northwest Florida Symphony Orchestra. His duties at Troy University include teaching private lessons and percussion methods courses and leading the award-winning Troy University Percussion Ensemble, who were winners of the 2012 and



2015 PAS International Percussion Ensemble Competition. In addition to performing recitals and administering clinics throughout the United States, Blackstock has performed internationally as a guest soloist in San Juan, Puerto Rico; Vilnius and Kaunas, Lithuania; Wroclaw, Warsaw, and Kolbuszowa, Poland; and most recently in Prague, Czech Republic and Manchester, England. A phenomenally skilled jazz and rock drummer, **Chad Wackerman**'s professional career began in 1978 with the Bill Watrous band. He has also recorded



six albums and toured with guitar legend Allan Holdsworth and played on the One Voice album and video with Barbra Streisand. He has performed, toured, and/or recorded with such diverse artists as Steve Vai, Andy Summers, Men At Work, Ed Mann, Albert Lee, Colin Hay, Dweezil Zappa, Pasqua/Holdsworth/Haslip/Wackerman Group, Terry Bozzio, Carl Verheyen, and David Garfield. Wackerman has also toured with James Taylor, John Patitucci, Joe Sample, Banned From Utopia, and The World Drummers Ensemble (Bill Bruford, Luis Conte, Dou Dou Ndiaye Rose and Chad Wackerman) and Chad Wackerman Trio. As a bandleader and composer, he has five critically acclaimed CDs: Forty Reasons, The View, Scream, Legs Eleven, and Dreams Nightmares and Improvisations. Wackerman has written music for the television show The Dennis Miller Show as well as composed music for Allan Holdsworth's recordings entitled Secrets, Wardenclyffe Tower, and Sixteen Men of Tain. Members of the trio performing at PASIC 2017 are Wackerman on drums, Jimmy Johnson on bass, and Mike Miller on guitar.

Born in 1956, American bass guitarist **Jimmy Johnson** is best known for his work with James Taylor, Allan Holdsworth, and Flim & the BB's. Raised in a rich musical environment, his father was a longtime member of the Minnesota Orchestra's bass section, his mother a piano teacher and accompanist, and his brother Gordon is also a professional bassist. Mike Miller, born in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, is a Los Angeles based guitarist who has performed on over 200 albums. Frank Epstein ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

Since 1968, Frank Epstein has been a percussionist with the world-renowned Boston Symphony Orchestra. He is currently a member of the Tanglewood Music Center, as well as the chairman of the Percussion and Brass departments at the New England Conservatory. As one of the founders of the Collage New Music Ensemble, he served as their musical director for over 25



years, and has recently authored the book *Cymbalisms*, a complete guide for the Orchestral Cymbal Player.

In 1969, Peter Kogan joined the Cleveland Orchestra as a section member under George Szell. Three years later, he was appointed Principal Percussionist and Associate Principal Timpanist of the Pittsburgh Symphony. In 1977, he left the Pittsburgh Symphony and spent six years in New York City as a drumset player and composer. He performed with Blues legends Lightnin' Hopkins,



Honey-Boy Edwards, and Jimmy Whitherspoon as well as with groups such as the Drifters and the Crystals, and Rock and Roll legend Bo Diddley. He also performed with the Larry Elgart Big Band and wrote for and performed with the fusion band, Scratch n' Sniff. Just 20 years old, 2017 Hit Like A Girl Marching Percussion Champion Anastasiya Kostromina (aka AJDrumz) was born in Russia and raised in Brooklyn, New York. Kostromina began drumming at the age of nine and eventually became section leader of the drumline, symphonic band, jazz band, and orchestra at Brooklyn's Fort



Hamilton High School. Later, she studied snare drum with former Blue Devil Pete Sapadin and drumset with George Gray. Extremely active in the New York City drumming scene, Kostromina is Creative and Social Media Director for Chop University, a member of the NBA's Brooklyn Nets Drumline, and has performed at venues such as Carnegie Hall, Apollo Theater, Tribeca Film Festival, Brooklyn Museum, and Barclay's Center. She was featured in *Tom Tom* magazine's "Oral History Of Female Drummers" and at the 2016 Kenzo and H&M Fashion Show. In addition to her musical skills, Kostromina is a talented photographer, videographer, online content creator, and social media specialist.

Kultur Grenade ■ Friday, 2:00 р.м.

Kultur Grenade is made up of musicians, actors, dancers, and visual artists. The collective attempts to blur the line between the four disciplines and exists together in the nexus points of common creative ground. The group comprises of



Michael Gould (percussion), Malcolm Tulip (actor/vocal artist), Marion Traenkle (scenography), and Nadja Raszewski (choreography) as core members with a host of guest artists to compliment their creative vision.

Michael Gould is a Professor of Music in the Jazz and Contemporary Improvisation Department in the School of Music, Theater & Dance and the Residential College (College of Literature, Science and the Arts) at the University of Michigan. Gould has received international recognition as a performer and scholar in the field of drumset, contemporary percussion performance, and pedagogy. He has released over 100 educational percussion videos through playalongmusic.com. He has also composed and performed music for a wide range of ensembles and venues from the Münich Opera and Ballet to National Public Radio. Gould has had unique collaborations with engineers, material scientists, painters, poets, dancers, athletes, and business professionals. His new book for the iPad entitiled *The Drum Diaries* is available worldwide through the Apple iTunes store. He is also Music Director for Tangente Dance Company in Berlin, Germany. Gould is a member of the PAS Board of Advisors.

Ken Mikolowski is the author of three books of poetry: *Thank You Call Again, little mysteries, and Big Enigmas.* His book *THAT THAT* was published by Wayne State University Press in 2015. Mikolowski teaches poetry writing at the Residential College of the University of Michigan. For more than thirty years he and his late wife Ann Mikolowski edited, published, and printed art, poetry, and collaborations as The Alternative Press.

Nadja Raszewski is a choreographer, dancer, and pedagogue. She was educated and trained in mime and pantomime by Jaques Lecoq (Paris, France); modern dance and composition by Eric Hawkins and Lucia Dlugoszewski (New York City, New York); contemporary dance by Maurice Bejart (Aix-en-Provence, France); modern dance technique, dance education, and choreography by Leanore Ickstadt (Berlin, Germany); Afro-Brazilian and samba by Germaine Acogny and Ismael Ivo (Vienna, Austria); and Hip-Hop styles by Niels Robitzky (Berlin, Germany). She is Lecturer at the University of Arts in Berlin, Germany. Raszewski has been invited to choreograph and perform throughout the world including Turkey, Finland, Switzerland, Israel, the Netherlandsm and the United States. She is Artistic Director of the TanzTangente, a school for contemporary dance, movement research, theater, and media.

Known as an actor and a director, **Malcolm Tulip** is also Associate Professor, Head of Directing, and Co-Lead Faculty of Interarts Performance in the Department of Theatre & Drama at the University of Michigan. He was an Associate Artist at The Performance Network in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where he directed twelve productions. He has written, produced, and performed eight original plays under the name of Prospero Theatre Co. Tulip toured extensively in Europe and the United States with I Gelati Theatre Co. and Theatre Grottesco. More recently in the United States, he has performed and choreographed at The Heritage Festival in Virginia as well as the New Jersey and Michigan Shakespeare Festivals.

Marion Tränkle works in media art and performance as an artist and lecturer. Educated in choreography, architecture and media technology, her scenographic work combines performative strategies with (image) spaces and digital transformation processes. Tränkle's work has been shown internationally in the media art context as well as in dance and theatre performances including Thessaloniki Biennale at the State Museum of Contemporary Art , OK Centre for Contemporary Art Linz, Netherlands Media Art Institute Amsterdam, University of Michigan, Bavarian State Opera Munich, and the State Theatre Saarbrücken. Rick Kurasz is currently Director of Percussion Studies at Western Illinois University. His duties include teaching applied percussion and directing the Western Illinois University Percussion Ensemble and Western Illinois University Steel Bands. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, Master of Music degree from the



University of Akron, and Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Kurasz is an active composer/arranger in the genre of steel band and published by Pan Ramajay Productions and Panyard, Inc. Before coming to Western Illinois University, Kurasz directed the University of Akron Steel Band, the University of Illinois Steel Band, I-Pan Steel Groove, the Idaho State University Steel Band, and his own combo Panak. He has twice traveled to Trinidad to perform in the National Panorama Festival with the bands Potential Symphony and Starlift.

Morris "Arnie" Lang ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M. Inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 2000, Morris "Arnie" Lang retired from the New York Philharmonic in 1995 after a 40-year career in the percussion section. As an educator, he has taught at the Oberlin Percussion Institute, the New York College of Music, the Manhattan School of Music, Kingsborough Community College and has served as chairperson of the per-



cussion department in the Conservatory of Music at Brooklyn College where he has taught since 1971. A former student of Saul Goodman, Morris Goldenberg and Billy Gladstone, Lang began his professional playing experience with performances for the New York City Ballet in 1951. He is also the founder of the Lang Percussion Company, which manufactures mallets, Goodman timpani and Gladstone snare drums. Lang has published eight books, including his popular *Dictionary of Percussion Terms* (written with Larry Spivack), along with over 30 contemporary compositions.

LAPQ ■ Thursday, 12:00 P.M.

Since 2009, the Grammy-nominated Los Angeles Percussion Quartet (LAPQ) has forged a distinct identity as a world-class contemporary chamber music ensemble that is dedicated to commissioning and presenting new works for percussion quartet. The guartet was



founded to create a classical percussion ensemble that would champion contributions of twentieth century West Coast composers while collaborating with local artists to continue innovation and exploration. LAPQ has contributed some of the most dynamic and captivating recordings of percussion music to date earning multiple Grammy nominations and "Best of" lists from iTunes and the New York Times. Additionally, the quarter members are dedicated to engaging with young composers and performers in order to share their knowledge of percussion music. Through commissioning projects and masterclasses, LAPQ educates developing artists with direct creative collaborations.

Dr. Lamon Lawhorn ■ Friday, 11:00 A.M.

Dr. Lamon Lawhorn is Assistant Director of Bands at North Carolina A&T State University, where he coordinates all aspects of percussion instruction within the band program including drumline and percussion ensemble. Additionally, Lawhorn teaches others courses within the North Carolina A&T State University Department of Music. A native of Fort Worth, Texas, he received a Bachelor of Music Education degree

from Prairie View A&M University, Master of Music degree in percussion performance from the University of Mississippi, and Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. He has performed in various orchestral ensembles, theatre productions as well as performed and toured with multiple artists on drumset. Active within PAS, Lawhorn serves as a member of the PAS Drumset Committee




Jean-Baptiste Leclère ■ Saturday, 1:00 P.M.


Chelsea Levine ■ Friday, 4:00 P.M.

David Degge currently lives in New York City, where he works as a freelance percussionist and teaches percussion privately in various capacities. Joe Locke ■ Saturday, 4:00 P.M.

Virtuosic vibraphone artist, bandleader, and composer Joe Locke is active as a clinician and educator worldwide. Since 2008, he has served as an international vibraphone consultant at the Royal Academy of Music in London, England. Locke has won numerous awards including the 2006, 2008, and 2009 Mallet Player of the Year awards from the Jazz Journalists Association



and the 2013 Hot House NYC Jazz Award for Best Vibes Player. Since joining Motéma Music in 2011, he has released several acclaimed recordings including *Signing*, *Wish Upon A Star*, *Lay Down My Heart*, and *Love Is a Pendulum*. Locke has performed and/or recorded with such renowned artists as Grover Washington, Jr., Kenny Barron, Dianne Reeves, Eddie Daniels, Bob Berg, Ron Carter, Rod Stewart, Randy Brecker, The Mingus Big Band, and Geoffrey Keezer.

Fabrice Marandola ■ Thursday, 1:00 P.M.

Fabrice Marandola is an Associate Professor of Percussion and Contemporary Music at the McGill University Schulich School of Music in Canada. Previously, he was Professor of Percussion Studies at the Conservatories of Angers and Grenoble in France, a pedagogy instructor at the Conservatory of Paris, and an invited professor at the Crane School of Music (SUNY-Potsdam, New



York). A founding member of Canadian percussion ensemble Sixtrum, he has an active career on the New Music scene, commissioning, performing, and recording new works for solo and chamber ensembles. Marandola holds a doctoral degree in ethnomusicology from Paris IV-Sorbonne and has conducted in depth field research in Cameroon. He is a member of the Centre for Interdisciplinary Research in Music Media and Technology of Montreal (CIRMMT) of which he was Associate Director of Artistic Research from 2009 to 2014. From 2015 to 2016, Marandola was Senior Research Chair at Sorbonne-Universités, where he led a multi-disciplinary research project on musical gesture.

Marimolin ■ Thursday, 5:00 р.м. ■ Friday Noon

Marimbist Nancy Zeltsman and violinist Sharan Leventhal founded Marimolin in Boston in October 1985, performed their debut recital in May 1986, and were extremely active until they disbanded in 1996. They have performed to-



gether occasionally since 2015 to commemorate thirty years since their debut. In the decade the duo worked together steadily, Marimolin premiered 79 pieces, raised over \$68,000 to commission new works (through numerous grants), and sponsored a composition contest for eight years which collectively attracted nearly 200 entries from around the world. The impact of the repertoire garnered by Marimolin has been substantial, particularly in the percussion world. Several of these pieces are now widely performed. The duo has recorded three CDs and performed across the United States and Europe.

Daniel "Tatita" Marquez ■ Friday, 3:00 P.M.

Percussionist and Candombe researcher, Daniel Marquez attended Escuela Municipal de Musica de Montevideo, Escuela Universitaria de Musica, and Universidad of Sao Paulo. Marquez has studied with Giovanni Hidalgo, Richie Flores, Ralph Irizarry, Marvin Diz, Johnny Almendra, Renato Thoms, and John Wooton. Marquez has garnered

14 research presentations on Candombe and released 8 albums in different Candombe genres. He was the Uruguayan cultural representative at the 2010 FIFA World Cup Fan Fest in South Africa, and also represented Uruguay at the 2012 Yeosu Expo in Korea, the 2013 SXSW Festival in Austin,



Texas, and the 2013 Inter Expo in Porto Alegre, Brazil. He was chosen by Jennifer Lopez and Marc Anthony to represent Uruguay in the television program *Q'Viva* and selected by UNESCO to conduct a survey of Candombe in Uruguay. Marquez plays in Jaime Roos' band 3 Millones, has recorded in Martin Cohen's studio in New York, and won the Graffiti award for his album *Mukunda*.

Shawn Mativetsky ■ Friday, 5:00 P.M.

Dynamic performer Shawn Mativetsky is considered one of Canada's leading ambassadors of the tabla, and is a pioneer in bridging the worlds of Western and Indian classical music. Called an "exceptional soloist" by critic Réjean Beaucage, WholeNote's Andrew Timar adds that "as a leading disciple of the renowned Sharda Sahai, he has serious street cred." Shawn Mativetsky is



highly sought-after as both performer and educator, and is active in the promotion of the tabla and North Indian classical music through lectures, workshops, and performances across Canada and internationally. Based in Montreal, Shawn teaches tabla and percussion at McGill University. His solo album, Payton MacDonald: Works for Tabla, was released in 2007, and Cycles, his recording of Canadian compositions for tabla, was released in the fall of 2011. He recently released Rivers, a solo tabla album rooted in the rich traditions of the Benares style of tabla playing.

Dr. Neeraj Mehta ■ Friday, 5:00 P.M.

Dr. Neeraj Mehta's work spans contemporary art, jazz, and world percussion music. He has worked with many notable artists from Steve Coleman to Clyde Stubblefield, and is a leading performer, researcher. and advocate of Danish composer Per Nørgård's music. In addition to his contemporary music work, he has received multiple grants to research the Afro-Cuban folkloric



music in Cuba, and is a founding member of Ensemble Duniya, a group that explores the intersection between contemporary art music and percussion music traditions from around the world. He frequently gives performances, lectures, and masterclasses at colleges and universities throughout the country as soloist and as half of the duo Percunova with Jonathan Ovalle. He maintains an active performance schedule in New York City, where he is Assistant Professor of Music at the City University of New York–Queensborough Community College.

Michigan State University Percussion Ensemble, Gwendolyn Dease-Director ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

The Michigan State University (MSU) Percussion Ensemble is made up of a diverse group of students. The ensemble includes undergraduate students major-



ing in music performance, education, and composition as well as graduate students in the master's, performance diploma, and doctoral program. The MSU Percussion Ensemble is dedicated primarily to the

performance of both new and classic repertoire for chamber percussion group. The ensemble has been previously invited to perform at PASIC 2013, the Great Lakes Chamber Music Festival, and on the Blue Griffin Recital Series. The MSU Percussion Ensemble has performed with many esteemed guest artists including Robert van Sice, Michael Burritt, Gordon Stout, Sō Percussion, and Francis Kofi. Alumni and current members of the ensemble hold teaching positions at colleges, universities, and high schools across the United States as well as in Argentina, Korea, and Taiwan. These ensemble members have also won numerous competitions and performed all over the world.

Oliver Molina ■ Saturday, 3:00 P.M.

Oliver Molina is Assistant Professor of Music and Assistant Director of Bands at Northwestern State University (NSU) of Louisiana. At NSU, Molina teaches the marching band percussion section, applied percussion lessons, an introduction to music education as well as conducts a concert band and co-directs the percussion ensemble. Molina is an active percussion per-



former, educator, arranger, adjudicator, and clinician. Currently Molina is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in percussion performance and pedagogy at the University of Iowa. He earned a Master of Music degree from the University of Arkansas and a Bachelor of Music Education degree from the University of Central Florida. His professional affiliations include PAS, College Music Society, and Pi Kappa Lambda Music Honor Society.

Elisa "Helly" Montin ■ Friday 9:00 A.M.

Elisa "Helly" Montin is a drummer and drum instructor from Venice, Italy. Born in 1994, the 2017 Hit Like A Girl Over-18 Champion started drumming at the age of 6. She began her formal training with renowned Italian drummer and teacher Sergio Pescara at 14 years of age. By the time she was 15 years old, Montin was already playing in pubs and clubs with tribute bands and



an original death metal project. Today, as she continues to tour, record, and teach, she also remains committed to improving her drumming and musicianship. Montin is currently a member of The Anunnaki (electronic hardcore) and Cattivator Of Death (satirical/humorous metal). Throughout her drumming career, she has been able to play with many different musical groups and had the opportunity to travel to several European countries. Montin won many drum contests and performed with famous artists from around the world at drum festivals such as the historic Italian event La Lunga Notte Della Batteria. She recently participated in the recording of The Heisenberg Diaries-Book A, a sci-fi/progressive rock/ metal opera created by Douglas Docker and the metal band Docker's Guild. This opera featured a cast of major international artists including Amanda Somerville, Elize Ryd, and Nita Strauss.

Eric Moore II ■ Thursday, 5:00 P.M.

Drummer, clinician, and innovator Eric Moore II started his professional career at age 4 playing in churches and surrounding areas with his father, an accomplished organist. In 2003, he won the coveted Guitar Center Drum Off. Soon after, Moore II was on the road touring and recording with artists and bands such as Sly and the Family Stone, New Edition, Bel Biv Davoe, Suicidal



Tendencies, Infectious Grooves, and Chico & El DeBarge. He has performed clinics around the globe including in Korea, Spain, Singapore, and the United Kingdom. His most recent recording with his newest band Lillake "shows off " his metal and odd time chops.

Valerie Naranjo ■ Thursday, 4:00 P.M.

Percussionist Valerie Naranjo has performed with the NBC Saturday Night Live Band for 22 years and on Broadway in Lion King for 21 years. She is the only Westerner to receive a first prize at Ghana's Kobine Festival of Traditional Arts. The film Knock on Wood documents this activity and has been shown from Woodstock to Katmandu. Naranjo has traveled to Ghana 21 times and



nine other African countries as well. She has appeared alongside such notable artists and groups as the Philip Glass Ensemble, Paul Winter Consort, Carole King, Zakir Hussein, Airto Moreira, and Glen Velez. She compiled with mentor Kakraba Lobi several CDs including West African Music for the Marimba Soloist and Joro featuring five concerti for gyil and orchestra. Naranjo teaches West African Percussion and Dance at New York University's (NYU's) Steinhardt School and performed in India and Cuba with NYU's Global Institute for Advanced Studies in 2017.

New Morse Code ■ Thursday, 11:00 A.M.

New Morse Code is devoted to bold and engaging performances of music worth sharing. Ensemble members Hannah Collins and Michael Compitello activate the unexpected range and unique sonic world of cello and percussion to



catalyze and champion the compelling works of young composers. For Collins and Compitello, collaboration involves drawing upon mutual influences while generating and refining material together over an extended period of time. Through close work with colleagues such as pianist and composer Paul Kerekes, steel pan virtuoso and composer Andy Akiho, Hawaiian composer and visual artist Tonia Ko, and Pulitzer Prize-winning violinist/vocalist/composer Caroline Shaw, New Morse Code generates a singular and personal repertoire reflecting both their friends' creative voices and their own perspectives. Collins and Compitello were finalists in the 2014 Concert Artists Guild Competition and recipients of a Classical Commissioning Grant from Chamber Music America with composer Christopher Stark. They are co-directors of the Avaloch Farm New Music Initiative, a summer residency program in Boscawen, New Hampshire designed to provide resources and support for performers and composers collaborating on new works. Collins and Compitello both teach at the University of Kansas. New Morse Code's debut album Simplicity Itself is available on New Focus Recordings.

Northwestern University, She-e Wu-Director ■ Friday, 10:00 A.M.

The Northwestern University Percussion Ensemble is an integral part of the curriculum at Northwestern University and under the direction of She-e Wu. The ensemble has won the PAS Interna-



tional Percussion Ensemble Competition four times and released a CD in 2006. The ensemble's repertoire ranges from Cage, Donatoni, Reich, Takemitsu, Varese, and Xanakis to world percussion drumming. Guest artists such as Steve Schick, Robin Engelman, Bob Becker, Anders Åstrand, Gordon Stout, Steve Smith, Bill Cahn, and Andy Narell have collaborated with the ensemble. Ensembles such as Sō Percussion, Amadinda Percussion Group, and Third Coast Percussion have all performed at Northwestern University and guest coached the ensemble. By November 16th 2017, the Northwestern University Percussion Ensemble will have hosted Steve Reich for two residencies with ensemble members working closely with Reich and performing his music.

Haley Nutt ■ Thursday, 1:00 P.M.

Haley Nutt is a master's student in historical musicology and percussion performance at Florida State University (FSU). In 2015, she received a bachelor's degree in music education from Texas Christian University (TCU). As a musicologist, Nutt's research interests include percussion and gender and the history of the percussion ensemble in the United States. She has published work



in the Percussive Arts Society journal *Rhythm! Scene* and has recently completed her master's thesis on women percussion composers of the twentieth century. As a performer, Nutt has played with numerous award-winning ensembles including the FSU Percussion Ensemble, the TCU Percussion Orchestra, the TCU Drumline, and the Crossmen Drum & Bugle Corps. She also plays drumset in the FSU Rock Ensemble. Nutt has also toured with the West Percussion group to Australia, Italy, and Hawaii as part of the International Festival of Winds and Percussion.

Phillip O'Banion ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

Phillip O'Banion is Assistant Professor of Percussion and Director of Percussion Studies at Temple University. Professionally, O'Banion often performs with the Philadelphia Orchestra and other symphonies, plays drumset and percussion with theater companies and choruses, and appears as chamber musician with groups such as Network for New Music. He remains active as a



recitalist, clinician, and soloist with orchestras, wind ensembles, chorus, and percussion groups. O'Banion co-chairs the PAS Symphonic Committee and is an officer in the PAS Pennsylvania Chapter. His current season includes performances in five states, Canada, and Argentina and as conductor or soloist on eight premieres and commissions including works by Marc Mellits, Adam Silverman, Gordon Stout, Ivan Trevino, Patrick Long, Lane Harder, Rolando Morales-Matos, and Donald McCullough.

Oberlin Percussion Group, Michael Rosen-Director ■ Thursday, 5:00 P.M.

Michael Rosen founded the Oberlin Percussion Group (OPG) upon joining the Oberlin faculty in 1972. Compositions are conducted only if necessary and students are encouraged to play like other



chamber music ensembles. Rosen program's compositions of historical significance by composers such as Cage, Cowell, Harrison, Russell, and Beyer in addition to the latest contemporary works. An objective is to premiere new works and to this end OPG has commissioned more than fifteen compositions by such composers as Lewis Nielson, Evan Hause, Ross Feller, Paul Cox, Randy Coleman, Dominique Lemaître, Matthew Jenkins, Michael Dougherty, John Luther Adams, Dary John Mizelle, and Edward Miller. OPG has presented the American premieres of many works including "The Hobbyhorse is Forgot" by Birtwistle, "Pleiades" by Xenakis, "Voûtes" by Levinas, "Marimbastück" by Ishii, "Sunspot" by Endo, "Darkness" by Donatoni, "Con Luigi Dallapiccola" by Nono, "Metal Metal" by Sandström, "Irama" by Roosendael, "Imaginario" by de Pablo, "Nocturnal Activities" by Buss, and "Preludio" by Malipiero.

Sean Paddock ■ Saturday, 10:00 A.M.

Drumset artist Sean Paddock has been Kenny Chesney's drummer since 1996. Early on, Paddock was given the additional responsibility of Musical Director (MD) overseeing the band and the quality of the show. Chesney's show has been named the best live show for six years of

Paddock's over ten year tenure as MD. Paddock plays all styles of music and spends much of his spare time in recording sessions. He credits his career beginnings to his public school band experiences and mentorship from musical family members including his parents. Over the years, he studied with Mike Meade, Dan Tomlinson, and Dom Moio. In addition to Chesney, Paddock has performed and/or recorded with such



notable artists and groups as Vince Gill, Sammy Hagar, John Mellencamp, Steve Miller, and George Strait. His television appearances with Chesney include Austin City Limits, Sound Stage, The Tonight Show with Jay Leno, Good Morning America, and The Today Show.

Doug Perkins ■ Thursday, 3:00 P.M.

Doug Perkins is currently a member of the Boston Conservatory Percussion Faculty and Director of the Chosen Vale International Percussion Seminar. Additionally, he was a founding member of Sō Percussion and the Meehan/Perkins Duo. He also performs regularly with Signal, eighth blackbird, and has collaborated with such composers as David Lang, Steve Reich, Paul Lansky, John



Luther Adams, Christian Wolff, Glenn Kotche, and Tristan Perich. Perkins's recordings are on the Bridge, Cantaloupe, Harmonia Mundi, New Focus, and New World labels.

William Platt ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

William Platt is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music, where he was a student of William G. Street. He is a former member of the U.S. Army Band in Washington, D.C. and the Rochester, NY and Richmond, VA Symphony Orchestras. He was the Principal Percussionist of the Cincinnati Symphony & Pops Orchestra from 1971 until his retirement in 2010. During his tenure in



Cincinnati, he recorded well over 100 CDs, mainly on the Telarc label, and participated in several tours of the United States, Europe, Japan, China, Singapore, Taiwan, and the Canary Islands. He is a former faculty member of the Ohio University and the Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. He is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the Cincinnati Symphony and the Symphonic Committee of PAS. He also serves as Visiting Instructor at the University of Southern California.

Brian Prechtl ■ Thursday, 4:00 P.M.

Brian Prechtl is an orchestral percussionist, music educator, and composer. He joined the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra (BSO) in 2003 and has performed with the Grand Teton Music Festival for twenty-six seasons. Prechtl earned degrees at the University of Michigan and Temple University studying with legends Charles Owen, Michael Udow, and Alan Abel. Prechtl, a



passionate advocate for music education, has worked as a mentor with the BSO's outreach program OrchKids since 2009. In 2016, he received a League of American Orchestras Ford Musician Award for Excellence in Community Service for work with students in Baltimore's most at-risk neighborhoods.

Putnam City North High School Percussion Ensemble, Dane Romano-Director ■ Friday 9:00 A.M.

Under the direction of Dane Romano, the Putnam City North High School Percussion Ensemble has performed eight years consecutively at the Oklahoma PAS Day of Percussion. This is the ensemble's first appearance at PASIC. The Putnam City North High School Percussion En-

semble is the third Oklahoma high school percussion ensemble to be selected as a winner in the PAS International Percussion Ensemble Competition.

Dane Romano is currently in his sixth year as the Assistant Director of Bands and Percussion at Putnam City North High School. A native



of Oklahoma, Romano earned a Bachelor of Music degree in performance, Bachelor of Music degree in instrumental music education, and Master of Music degree in instrumental performance from Oklahoma City University. In 2010 and 2012, he competed and was named a semi-finalist in the Southern California Marimba Competition. In 2013, Romano founded and became the Executive Director of the Great Plains International Marimba Competition based out of Oklahoma City. He holds a doctoral degree from McGill University, where he researched the performance of pieces for percussion and electronics and studied with Aiyun Huang and D'Arcy Philip Gray. As a performer,



Rocha has premiered percussion works by composers such as Lewis Nielson, Douglas Boyce, Jacob Sudol (USA), Sérgio Freire, Sílvio Ferraz, Roberto Victorio, Edson Zampronha (Brazil), João Pedro Oliveira (Portugal), Nicolas Gilbert and Geof Holbrook (Canada). He has appeared in several music festivals in Brazil as both a soloist and a chamber musician. Also, Rocha has performed in many countries including Argentina, Chile, Uruguay, Portugal, Germany, France, Canada, and the United States. He is currently a member of Duo Qattus with cellist Elise Pittenger and the ensemble Tectum, dedicated to the creation of new works for percussion and electronics. Rocha is Music Director of Sonante 21 and Director of the UFMG Percussion Ensemble.

Kaz Rodriguez ■ Thursday, 11:00 A.M.

Kaz Rodriguez is a touring session drummer, who incorporates a concept of hybrid drumming in his playing utilizing electronic with acoustic drumming. He has presented masterclasses internationally, sharing the stage with such other drumset artists as Claus Hessler, Mark Guliana, David Garibaldi, Steve Smith, and Gerald Hay-



ward. Rodriguez is known for making backing tracks enjoyed by drummers such as Aaron Spears, Tony Royster Jr., Eric Moore II, and Chris Coleman.

Michael Rosen Friday, 11:00 а.м.

Michael Rosen is Professor of Percussion at Oberlin Conservatory of Music and Director of the Oberlin Percussion Group and Oberlin Percussion Institute. He was Principal Percussionist with the Milwaukee Symphony from 1966 to 1972 and has performed with the Grand Teton Music Festival, Cleveland Orchestra, and Concertgebouw Orchestra. A native of Philadelphia,



Rosen was a student of Charles Owen, Fred Hinger, and Cloyd Duff. Rosen has been a member of the PAS Board of Directors and maintains a column in *Percussive Notes* entitled "Terms Used in Percussion." He has recorded for Opus One, Bayerische Rundfunk, Albany, Lumina, and CRI labels. A clinician on marimba as well as cymbals, Rosen has concertized and taught extensively in France, Italy, Germany, Spain, Denmark, Finland, Hong Kong, and Beijing. In 2014, he was honored with the PAS Lifetime Achievement in Education Award. Also in the same year, Rosen received the Ruth Strickland Gardner Professorship from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music.

Sherry Rubins ■ Thursday, 9:00 A.M.

Sherry Rubins is Coordinator of Percussion Studies at the University of Texas at San Antonio. Additionally, she is a member of the PAS Board of Advisors. Rubins has been a certified group exercise instructor for over thirty years and has presented several "Mind, Body, and Spirit" sessions at previous PASICs.



Adam Rudolph ■ Thursday 5:00 P.M.

For the past four decades, composer and percussionist Adam Rudolph has performed extensively throughout North America, South America, Europe, Africa, and Asia. He has released over thirty recordings under his own name, featuring his compositions and percussion works. Rudolph composes for his Moving Pictures Octet, Hu: Vibrational Percussion group, and Go: Organic



Orchestra. He has conducted hundreds of musicians worldwide in his Go: Organic Orchestra. Rudolph has performed with Yusef Lateef, Don Cherry, Sam Rivers, Pharaoh Sanders, Muhal Richard Abrams, Shankar, Wadada Leo Smith, Philip Glass, Jon Hassel, Omar Sosa, and Fred Anderson. He is one the early innovators of "world music." In 1978, Rudolph co-founded the Mandingo Griot Society with Foday Musa Suso. Furthermore, in 1988, he recorded the first fusion of American and Gnawa music with Hassan Hakmoun. In 2006, Advance Music published Rudolph's book, "Pure Rhythm."

Bill Sallak ■ Friday, 1:00 P.M.

Bill Sallak is Assistant Professor of Music at the University of Wisconsin at Green Bay (UW-Green Bay), where he teaches percussion, recording technology, and world music. Chair of the PAS New Music/Research Committee and a member of the Akros Percussion Collective, he has worked closely with such composers as Stuart Saunders Smith, Tom DeLio, John Luther Adams,



and Chris Shultis and performed with the Phoenix and Akron Symphonies. His work has appeared at numerous festivals in Finland, Germany, Scotland, South Korea, Mexico, Greece, Canada, and throughout the United States. Prior to his appointment at UW-Green Bay, Sallak served

on the faculties of Kent State University, Ohio University, the Nief-Norf Summer Festival, and the Maricopa County (AZ) Community Colleges. He holds degrees from SUNY-Fredonia, the University of Akron, and Arizona State University.

Wayne Salzmann II ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

Wayne Salzmann II is best known for his work with Grammy award-winning guitar virtuoso Eric Johnson. He has performed and toured with Johnson worldwide and recorded several successful albums with him as well. Salzmann II has been Instructor of Drumset Studies at the University of Texas at Austin since 2010. He has presented dozens of clinics and masterclasses



at universities and music conservatories across the United States and abroad. Salzmann II has performed and/or recorded with a wide variety of artists such as Steve Miller, Kenny Rogers, Kris Kristofferson, Joe Satriani, Christopher Cross, Robben Ford, Mike Stern, Joe Bonamassa, Oz Noy, Sonny Landreth, Albert Lee, Bobby Mcferrin, Chris Potter, Jeff Coffin, Bill Watrous, Terence Blanchard, Esperanza Spalding, Carmen Bradford, and Andre Hayward. He has been featured on dozens of albums, music videos, commercial jingles, television shows, and Hollywood film soundtracks. Salzmann II is an active member of the PAS Drumset Committee.

The Sam Houston Percussion Group ■ Thursday, 1:00 P.M.

The Sam Houston Percussion Group, under the direction of John Lane, is the premiere percussion ensemble at Sam Houston State University (SHSU). Comprised of a select group of students, the ensemble is featured regularly on



the SHSU Contemporary Music Festival. Dedicated to bringing about and championing new and imaginative repertoire for percussion, the group has worked alongside and commissioned composers such as John Luther Adams, Mark Applebaum, Monica Pearce, David Adams, Wenhui Xie, Jeff Herriott, Kyle Gann, and Peter Garland. Interdisciplinary collaborations have also played a key role in expanding opportunities for students to work alongside other artists including visual artists, dancers, filmmakers, and poets. Through the Academic Community Engagement program, students actively promote the arts in the local community through performances and collaborations with organizations such as The Wynne Home Arts Center as well as working to develop programs and partnerships internationally.

Sandbox Percussion ■ Wednesday, 8:00 P.M.

Lauded by The Washington Post as "revitalizing the world of contemporary music" with "jawdropping virtuosity," Sandbox Percussion members have established themselves as leading proponents in this generation of contemporary



percussion chamber music. Brought together by their love of chamber music and the simple joy of playing together, ensemble members captivate audiences with performances that are both visually and aurally stunning. Rob Sanderl ■ Thursday, Noon

Rob Sanderl is a native of upstate New York and is a percussion performer, educator, composer, and pedagogue in the United States. Currently, Sanderl is Associate Professor of Music at Radford University (RU) in Radford, Virginia, where he is Director of the award-winning Radford University Percussion Ensemble. The RU Percussion Ensemble has won competitions, performed



in Europe, and at numerous PAS Days of Percussion. The group most recently performed at the Kennedy Center. Sanderl received his Bachelor of Music Education degree from the Crane School of Music as well as his Master of Music degree and Doctor of Musical Arts degree from the Eastman School of Music. He has performed throughout the United States and in Europe, including as a featured soloist at the 2008 International Percussion Ensemble Week in Croatia. Sanderl has also presented clinics at The Midwest Clinic and the National Association for Music Education Conference.

Shane Shanahan and Todd Roach ■ Friday, 9:00 A.M.

Shane Shanahan and Todd Roach met while working on events for the North American Frame Drum Association (NAFDA). This setting provided them with the opportunity to begin exchanging ideas about teaching and composing. After appearing together in many NAFDA festivals, they began working on their own program of compositions featuring frame drums and world percussion. Grammy-nominated percussionist Shane Shanahan has been touring since 2000 as an original member of Yo-Yo Ma's Silk Road Ensemble. He has also performed with Philip Glass, Glen Velez, James Taylor, Alison Krause, and Aretha Franklin. In addition, Shanahan has been Artist in Residence at The Hartt School of Music, Harvard University, and Princeton University.





Todd Roach has performed with a diverse group of artists including the Paul Winter Consort, violinist Georges Lammam, vocalist K.S. Resmi, cellist Eugene Friesen, and percussionist N. Scott Robinson. He has also performed multiple times at Tamburi Mundi (International Frame Drum Festival).

Sō Percussion ■ Friday, 8:00 P.M.

With innovative multi-genre original productions, sensational interpretations of modern classics, and an "exhilarating blend of precision and anarchy, rigor and bedlam," (*The New Yorker*), Sō Percussion has redefined the scope and role of the modern percussion en-



semble, placing it at the leading edge of 21st century music. Sō's work encompasses more than 20 albums, a dizzying array of collaborative projects, a steady output of their own music, performances at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Walt Disney Hall, the Barbican; appearances with Dawn Upshaw, the JACK Quartet, Caroline Shaw, the National, the Mostly Mozart Orchestra and Louis Langrée, the LA Phil and Gustavo Dudamel; and throughout the world. Sō Percussion is the Edward T. Cone Ensemble-in-Residence at Princeton University and runs the annual Sō Percussion Summer Institute (SōSI). Members of the ensemble

are co-directors of the percussion department at the Bard College-Conservatory of Music. Sō Percussion members are Eric Cha-Beach, Josh Quillen, Adam Sliwinski, and Jason Treuting.

Steven Schick ■ Wednesday, 8:00 P.M.

Percussionist, conductor, and author Steven Schick was born in Iowa and raised in a farming family. Hailed by Alex Ross in *The New Yorker* as, "one of our supreme living virtuosos, not just of percussion but of any instrument," he has championed contemporary percussion music by commissioning or premiering more than one hundred-fifty new works. The most important of



these have become core repertory for solo percussion. Schick was inducted into the PAS Hall of Fame in 2014. He is Artistic Director of the La Jolla Symphony and Chorus and the San Francisco Contemporary Music Players. As a conductor, he has appeared with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, the Milwaukee Symphony, Ensemble Modern, the International Contemporary Ensemble (ICE), and the Asko/Schönberg Ensemble. Schick's publications include a book, The Percussionist's Art: Same Bed, Different Dreams, and many articles. He has released numerous recordings including the 2010 Percussion Works of Iannis Xenakis, and its companion, The Complete Early Percussion Works of Karlheinz Stockhausen in 2014 (both on the Mode label). Schick is Distinguished Professor of Music and holds the Reed Family Presidential Chair at the University of California at San Diego.

Steve Smith ■ Friday, 5:00 P.M. ■ Saturday, 8:00 P.M.

Steve Smith's drumming, while always decidedly modern, can best be described as a style that embodies the history of American music. Smith began studying drumming at age nine. After high school, he continued his music studies at the Berklee College of Music. In 1974, Smith's professional career began with his two-year



tenure in the Lin Biviano Big Band, while continuing his Berklee studies. In 1976, Smith began his association with jazz-fusion by joining violinist Jean-Luc Ponty's group. It was while touring with rocker Ronnie Montrose a couple years later that Smith was asked to join the popular rock band, Journey. With Journey, Smith toured around the world and recorded numerous successful albums including the immensely popular Escape (Columbia 1981) and Frontiers (Columbia 1983), both of which garnered the band many "Top 40" hits. To date, the Journey catalogue has worldwide sales of more than 80 million albums. Smith began leading his own jazz-rock-fusion band, Steve Smith and Vital Information, while still a member of Journey. In 1985, Smith left Journey to pursue his original passion, jazz, and to continue developing his career. Smith has played on many hits with such diverse artists as Bryan Adams, Mariah Carey, Andrea Bocelli, Dweezil Zappa, Ray Price, and Savage Garden. He has maintained an extensive touring and recording career, appearing with many jazz luminaries such as Mike Mainieri's group, Steps Ahead. This band, which included virtuosos such as Michael Brecker, Richard Bona, and Mike Stern, was one of the most successful electric jazz groups. Smith contributed greatly to the group for seven years from 1986 to 1993 and again from 2005 to the present. In 2002, Smith was voted into the Modern Drummer Hall of Fame. Other high profile jazz touring and/or recording gigs that filled Smith's schedule include such artists as Ahmad Jamal, Stanley Clarke, Randy Brecker, George Brooks' Summit, and the Buddy Rich Big Band, with whom he has performed in many tribute concerts to the late drumming idol. Smith joined Journey in the recording studio in 1996 to record the reunion album Trial By Fire. He then rejoined Journey for the third time

in 2015. Smith was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame as a member of Journey on April 7, 2017.

Emily Tannert ■ Friday, 9:00 A.M.

Emily Tannert is Percussion Director at Rouse High School and Wiley Middle School in Leander, Texas. Wiley Middle School was a 2016 PAS International Percussion Ensemble Competition winner. She was previously Percussion Director at East View High School in Georgetown, Texas from 2011 until 2015, where her ensembles garnered numerous accolades. Tannert is also



active as a percussion arranger, having written for drumlines and concert WGI ensembles in Texas, Michigan, and Ohio. She received her bachelor's and master's of music degrees, along with an undergraduate performance certificate in percussion, both from the University of Texas at Austin, where she studied with Thomas Burritt and Tony Edwards. Tannert also received a bachelor's degree in journalism and political science from Northwestern University in 2004.

The Airmen of Note is the premier jazz ensemble of the United States Air Force. Created in 1950 to carry on the tradition of Major



Glenn Miller's Army Air Forces dance band, today the "Note" features 18 of the most talented jazz musicians in the country and is one of the last touring big bands. Through the years, the Airmen of Note has presented its exciting brand of big band jazz to audiences throughout the United States, dozens of countries in Europe and Asia, as well as back home in the Washington, D.C. area. The Airmen of Note's steadfast commitment to musical excellence and reputation for setting the highest standards has earned the respect of the world's foremost jazz artists. This has led to many collaborative efforts, recordings, and performances with such luminaries as Dizzy Gillespie, Joe Williams, Sarah Vaughan and Nancy Wilson. In 1990, the Airmen of Note established the Jazz Heritage Series, featuring the "Note" in concert with legendary icons of jazz. Artists that have participated in this series include Clark Terry, Phil Woods, Kurt Elling, Paquito D'Rivera, Nicholas Payton, and Karrin Allyson. In 2010, the Airmen of Note celebrated 60 years as one of our nation's most revered musical organizations.

Andy Thierauf ■ Saturday, 2:00 P.M.

Andy Thierauf is a Philadelphia based percussionist who specializes in the creation and performance of contemporary music. He is particularly interested in combining percussion with theater, dance, and technology. Andy teaches at Settlement Music School and is an adjunct professor of percussion at Kutztown University. He has appeared in Philadelphia, New York, Boston,



Argentina, and across the Midwest at music festivals, conferences, and symposiums. Andy has performed at SEAMUS and PASIC on several occasions and is a member of the PAS Music Technology Committee. His creative research centers on seamlessly integrating technology into performance to produce collaborative, multi-media presentations with writers, dancers, actors, choreographers, and composers. In 2016 he self-published a collection of works for solo percussion and live electronics titled The Post Modern Percussionist. A native of Cincinnati, OH, Andy received his B.M. from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music, his M.M. from The Ohio State University, and his D.M.A. degree from the University of Iowa.

Joseph Tompkins ■ Friday 10:00 A.M.

Joseph Tompkins has performed with many of the top orchestras in the world, including the New York Philharmonic, Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, London Symphony Orchestra, Orchestra of St. Luke's, Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, and New York City Ballet Orchestra. He has performed in twenty-one Broadway productions and a number of major film soundtracks. His works



for percussion, particularly snare drum, have been performed around the world. Tompkins has presented masterclasses across Europe and the United States. Currently, he is Area Coordinator for the Percussion Department at Rutgers University.

Twelve-year old California native Annapurna "AP" Tobler is a 2017 "Hit Like a Girl" finalist and winner of the popular vote in the under 18 category. She has been drumming for four years, working with instructors at San José School of Rock and participating in the school's house band. She has recently started working with San José jazz drummer Wally Schnalle and has



balanced her passion for rock with an appreciation for jazz drumming. While drumming is her first love, Tobler also plays guitar and bass. For now she is proud of her live shows and video covers. Tobler's dream is to become a touring musician and travel the world.

Transient Canvas ■ Thursday, 9:00 A.M.

Praised by *The Boston Globe* as "superb," Amy Advocat and Matt Sharrock have been blazing their own trails as the bass clarinet/marimba duo Transient Canvas since 2011. They have premiered over 75 works and performed across the United States and Europe. Additionally, the duo has performed at the Alba Music Festival (Alba, Italy), SoundNOW Festival (Atlanta, Georgia),



New Music Gathering (San Francisco, California), New Music at the Short North Stage (Columbus, Ohio), and the Boston New Music Festival (Boston, Massachusetts). Additionally, the duo has held residencies with the composition departments at Harvard, Northeastern, Brandeis, Otterbein, and Tufts Universities as well as at the University of Georgia, Vermont College of Fine Arts, and Boston Conservatory. Transient Canvas's debut album *Sift* is available on New Focus Recordings.

Trio SR9 ■ Friday, 4:00 P.M.

The French Trio SR9 promotes a creative vision of contemporary Western drumming. The trio's special way of reviewing and transcribing works of great composers showcases how committed the members are to classical and contemporary musical heritage.



The ensemble released it first CD *Bach au marimba* in October 2015 under the Label Naïve. The Trio SR9 likes to collaborate with various artists to explore other artistic fields and create new projects, where all disciplines merge into one creative expression. In 2015, they created their first show called Machine(s) with composers P. Jodlowski and B. Montambault. The same year, the trio toured France with the show Corporels, revealing a mix of living art related to motion. Formed in 2010 at the National Superior Conservatory of Lyon, Trio SR9 won the 2012 International Music Competition in Luxembourg. The group has performed and presented clinics in Europe and the United States.

Kelli Rae Tubbs ■ Friday, 2:00 р.м.

Drummer, percussionist, and bandleader of ensembles specializing in the music of the 1920s, Kelli Rae Tubbs has amassed a library of more than 2,500 arrangements, which date from the 1880s to the 1950s. These include works for dance bands, theater orchestras, and unique photo play (silent film) compositions.

Cameron Tummel is a professional drum circle facilitator, DCF mentor trainer, and djembe player. Currently, he is President of the Drum Circle Facilitators Guild, the largest organization of professional drum circle facilitators in the world. Also, Tummel is an Executive Co-Creator of Rhythm For Youth, a professional developmental training curriculum to implement drum-



ming programs for youth 5 to 18 years of age. He has a Master of Fine Arts degree in world percussion from the California Institute of the Arts and is a Village Music Circles Certified Drum Circle Facilitator. Tummel also produces instructional recordings and videos about djembe drumming. He has performed with renowned drummers Abdoulaye Diakite, Babatunde Olatunji, Randy Gloss, Jose "Pepe" Danza, Malik Sow, and Mickey Hart.

University of Kansas West African Drum Ensemble

■ Friday, Noon

The KU West African Drum Ensemble won the Percussive Arts Society's World Percussion Ensemble Competition for 2017 and will perform at the 2017 PASIC. They play traditional music from three main



areas in West Africa: djembe and dunun drums from the ancient empire of Mali, which today encompasses areas of Guinea, Senegal, Mali, Sierra Leone, Cote D'Ivoire, and Burkina Faso; sabar drums from the Wolof of Senegal, which include mbëng mbëng, nder, tungune, cól, talmbat, and tama; and the Ga drums of Ghana, which include kpanlogo drums, gankogui, axatse, atoke, and tamalin. The group focuses on developing healthy technique, playing traditional parts and improvisational ideas, learning about the cultural context of the music and finding joy and excellence in playing.

University of Texas at Arlington Percussion Ensemble, Dr. Andrew Eldridge-Director ■ Thursday, 3:30 P.M.

The University of Texas at Arlington Percussion Ensemble (UTA), under the direction of Dr. Andrew Eldridge, is committed to the highest standards of percussion



performance. Whether it is through the commissioning of new works for percussion or performing for audiences on and off campus, members of the UTA Percussion Ensemble learn essential skills that translate directly to their future careers in percussion. The ensemble was previously selected to perform at the 2017 Texas Music Educators Association (TMEA) Convention in San Antonio, Texas, and will present the New Literature for Percussion Ensemble Session at the 2017 Percussive Arts Society International Convention in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Joseph Van Hassel ■ Thursday, 9:00 A.M.

Joseph Van Hassel is a North Carolina-based percussionist specializing in orchestral and chamber music. Active in the performance of new repertoire, he has individually commissioned and premiered works by many composers, and is especially noted for his close working relationships with David Macbride, Stuart Saunders Smith, and Dan Van Hassel. He can be heard on recordings



for the Innova, Mode, Equilibrium, nobrow.sounds, and Ohio Percussion record labels. His solo CD of percussion commissions is available on Soundset Recordings. Van Hassel is on the percussion faculty at the University of North Carolina at Pembroke and is a member of the PAS New Music/Research Committee. Drummer Johnny Vidacovich from New Orleans, Louisiana is a member of the band Astral Project. Over his long and illustrious career, Vidacovich has performed with such well-known musicians as Bobby McFerrin, James Booker, Professor Longhair, Stanton Moore, Johnny Adam, George Porter Jr., and of course, Astral Project, a cornerstone of the New Orleans jazz scene since the



early 1970s. Kaoru Watanabe, a Grammy nominated, Brooklyn-based musician and composer, is known for seamlessly combining traditional ritual and theater musics of Japan with complex compositional and improvisational elements of jazz and other world musics. He was a performing member and Artistic Director of the Japanese taiko performing arts group Kodo for close to a decade. Since



leaving Kodo, Watanabe has collaborated with such luminaries as Yo-Yo Ma and the Silk Road Ensemble, MacArthur Fellow Jason Moran, Japanese National Living Treasure Bando Tamasaburo, and Sō Percussion. He has performed his compositions at such prestigious venues as Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Kennedy Center, Whitney Museum, and Kabukiza. Additionally, he has taught at the Tanglewood Festival, Princeton University, and through Miyamoto Unosuke Shoten's online resource, KaDON. Watanabe's music was featured in Martin Scorsese's film Silence.

Richard Weiner ■ Thursday, 10:00 A.M.

Richard Weiner was a member of The Cleveland Orchestra for 48 years. Appointed by George Szell in 1963, he has performed on over 175 recordings and played over 100 premieres. He received a B.S. in Education from Temple University, a M.M. with Distinction from Indiana University where he was the first percussionist to receive the Performer's Certificate Award. His



teachers were Charles Owen and George Gaber. In 1976, he received a Juris Doctor degree, magna cum laude, from Cleveland State University. He has been a PAS member for 40 years and has presented many symphonic percussion clinics and labs at PASIC. Mr. Weiner is Co-head of the percussion and timpani department at The Cleveland Institute of Music and is a faculty member at The National Orchestral Institute. He has served as guest faculty at the New World Symphony and previously was a faculty member at Oberlin College.

Hannah Ford-Welton ■ Saturday, 1:00 р.м.

Hannah Ford-Welton was immersed in the performing arts from a young age, dancing from the time she was three and gravitating toward the drums by age seven. She received practical playing experience and ear training as part of her school ensemble, The Fabulous Leopard Percussionists. Her evolution continued through study with some of the world's greatest drummers and



teachers including Diane Downs, Louie Bellson, Ruben Alvarez, Jerry Steinholtz and Ndugu Chancler. Launching her professional career at age twelve, she is the only female to win the Louis Bellson Heritage Days Drums Competition (2006). In the last decade, Nicholas White has put together one of the world's largest collections of antique percussion sound effects (collectively known as "traps"), many of which were used in the accompaniment of silent films. White also reproduces these rare instruments, allowing many to be available to modern percussionists for the first time in over a century.



William "Bill" G. Wiggins Friday, 3:00 P.M.

Bill Wiggins is Associate Professor of Percussion Studies at the Blair School of Music of Vanderbilt University and Principal Timpanist of the Peninsula Music Festival Orchestra of Door County, Wisconsin. Until his retirement in 2015, he served as Principal Timpanist of the Nashville Symphony Orchestra for 49 years. He can be heard on recordings on the Naxos, Decca, Mercury and



Magnatone labels including Grammy Award winning recordings of music of Michael Daugherty, Stephan Paulus, Joseph Schwantner, and Joan Tower. Wiggins holds degrees from Northwestern University and George Peabody College for Teachers. He has been an active member of PAS since 1970 hosting the first Tennessee PAS Day of Percussion at George Peabody College in 1974 as well as served as Host of PASIC 1989 and PASIC 1996. He also served on the PAS Board of Directors from 1996 to 2001 and PAS Symphonic Committee. Wiggins is a Life Member of the Nashville Musicians Association, Local 257 American Federation of Musicians.

William J. Brennan Brennan High School Percussion Ensemble, Kyle Pridgen, Thomas Kober, and Tim Briones-Directors

Opened in 2010, William J. Brennan High School (BHS) is located in San Antonio, Texas. The BHS Percussion Ensemble is under the



direction of Kyle Pridgen and Tim Briones. Under their direction, the BHS Percussion Ensemble was selected as a winner in the high school category of the 2017 PAS International Percussion Ensemble Competition. The BHS percussion program has consistently produced Texas Music Educators Association All-State Percussionists in the 5A and 6A categories. At Texas state solo and ensemble contests, the BHS percussion program has had multiple players awarded the title of outstanding soloist. Since the school opened, members of the BHS percussion program have had the pleasure to collaborate and perform with renowned groups and artists such as Line upon Line, Ivan Trevino, and Thomas Burritt.

Thomas Kober is in his second year as Director of Bands at BHS. He is a graduate of Texas Christian University in Fort Worth, Texas with a bachelor's degree in music education and currently pursuing a master's degree in instrumental conducting from the University of Texas at San Antonio, where he is a graduate assistant for all university bands. Andrew Worden ■ Thursday, 9:00 A.M.

Andrew Worden is a drummer, percussionist, and composer currently living in Boston, Massachusetts. As a composer, Worden has been commissioned by Michael Burritt, Escape Ten, and Virginia Tech. His percussion music is performed frequently in conservatories and universities with recent performances in France, Greece, Colombia, Germany, Switzerland, Japan, Malaysia, and



across the United States. After the Eastman Percussion Ensemble released a video of "Escape" on YouTube, the work has been performed numerous times, including by the Paris Percussion Group and in Chicago Symphony Center. Worden performs and writes for Big Trouble, a new project for percussion, drums, and voice with Ivan Trevino, and is Program Manager of Entrepreneurial Musicianship at the New England Conservatory. He earned the Master of Music degree from the Eastman School of Music, where he went on to complete a fellowship in Health & Wellness and Arts Leadership Certificate.

Dr. Stephen K. Workman ■ Saturday, 10:00 A.M.

Dr. Stephen K. Workman is a Doctor of Chiropractic, holding licenses in both Utah and Oregon. Workman earned a bachelor's degree in exercise science and human biology and a master's degree in sports medicine. He is a member of the PAS Health and Wellness Committee as well as the Performing Arts Medicine Associa-



tion. Workman has had many articles published in *Percussive Notes* about injury, health, and fitness. As a musician, he has performed on drums and percussion for the past 20 years and has been an instructor for over 15 years. Workman treats numerous professional and elite musicians, athletes (including Olympians), dancers, and other performing arts professionals to maintain their health, recover from injuries, and stay in peak physical condition.

She-e Wu's 2017-2018 season features recitals, concert series, and extensive tours in Europe, Asia, and the United States. She premiered *Imaginary Day* a duo concerto with Chris Deviney by Pat Metheny with the Philadelphia Orchestra

The Xavier University Percussion Ensemble is an instrumental group dedicated to performing works from a diversity of styles and composers. In addition to playing standard repertoire of the percussion ensemble genre,



the ensemble holds a special interest in new works written specifically for percussion and electroacoustic percussion, as well as other classical, popular, and ethnically or culturally influenced music adapted for percussion ensemble. The ensemble is part of Xavier University's School for Arts and Innovation, is inclusive of all ability levels, and open to all students at Xavier University. The Xavier University Percussion Ensemble is under the direction of Brady Harrison. Current Ensemble Personnel: Brandon Carter, Joe Hunkler, Conner Miller, Kelsey Moore, Ethan Smith, Matthew Sweeterman.

ow in its 56th year, the Percussive Arts Society (PAS) is a non-profit, music-service organization whose mission is to inspire, educate, and support percussionists and drummers throughout the world. Today, the society is over 5,000 members strong, with 47 chapters located across the United States and an additional 21 chapters outside the U.S.

PAS publishes two bi-monthly publications, *Percussive Notes* and *Rhythm! Scene*™ (formerly *Percussion News*), and maintains a comprehensive website of percussion education resources. The society also maintains Rhythm! Discovery Center—the world's foremost drum and percussion museum. Rhythm! features unique, interactive exhibits highlighting a rich collection of historic artifacts and hands-on percussion instruments and offers a diverse array of educational programming and musical performances from local and national performing groups. Each year PAS hosts the largest percussion convention in the world, the Percussive Arts Society International Convention (PASIC), featuring the top names in drumming and percussion. In addition, domestic and international PAS chapters host Days of Percussion and other clinics in their regions throughout the year.

The fourteen percussionists and educators who met for dinner at the 1960 Midwest Band and Orchestra Clinic in Chicago could scarcely have imagined what the PAS would ultimately grow into. Their goal was simply to discuss the possibility of establishing a national organization that would "bring up to date the present standards in solo and ensemble contests, stimulate a greater interest in percussion performance and teaching, and promote better teaching of percussion instruments."

In January, 1961 during the SW-MENC convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, a meeting was held at which Jim Sewrey suggested the name Percussive Arts Society to Remo Belli. Following this meeting, Robert Winslow, a professional percussionist and North Hollywood band director who served as an educational advisor to Belli, sent a letter proclaiming: "The Percussive Arts Society is open for business," and in September, 1961, the society sent its first publication, Percussive Arts Society Bulletin, printed on a mimeograph machine donated by Belli, to the membership. The fourteen originating members listed in the first Percussive Arts Society Bulletin were Remo Belli, Warren Benson, Mervin Britton, Robert Buggert, Don Canedy, Rey Longyear, Charles Lutz, Jack McKenzie, James L. Moore, Verne Reimer, Jim Salmon, Hugh W. Soebbing, Charles Spohn, and Robert Winslow.

After three Bulletins, the administrative and publication duties of the society were transferred to Donald Canedy, percussion instructor and band director at Southern Illinois University. In April of 1963, Canedy, with the advice of a distinguished editorial board and an able group of contributing editors, published the new PAS journal, *Percussionist* (later called *Percussive Notes Research Edition*). In 1967, James L. Moore's already successful magazine, *Percussive Notes*, became an official PAS publication.

Canedy served as de facto president through 1964, when, at the December Percussive Arts Society meeting in Chicago, a constitution was adopted and officers were elected. Gordon Peters became the first President of PAS, Jack McKenzie took the position of First Vice-President, and Canedy was named Executive Secretary. Also elected were a board of directors and an editorial board. With this structure, the society became increasingly influential, expanding its committee activities to address important percussion issues and making policy decisions that would result in important contributions to all areas of percussion.

Beginning in 1971, performances and clinics called Days of Percussion were held in conjunction with the yearly business meetings. In 1974, the first Percussive Arts Society National Conference (PASNC) was held in Anaheim and at California State University at Northridge. The PASNC evolved into the Percussive Arts Society International Convention that we know today as PASIC. The first PASIC was held in 1976 at the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York, and was hosted by John Beck, the Eastman School, and the New York State PAS Chapter.

In 1972, PAS established its Hall of Fame to recognize the contributions of the most highly regarded professional leaders in percussion performance, education, research, scholarship, administration, composition, and the industry. The awards are presented every year at PASIC.

In addition to the Hall of Fame award, each year at PASIC the society presents four awards to recognize individuals who have made significant contributions in service to PAS or the field of percussion: Outstanding Service Award, Outstanding Supporter Award, Outstanding Chapter President Award, and the President's Industry Award. PAS also recognizes outstanding educators through the Lifetime Achievement in Education Award, which is the society's most prestigious award next to the Hall of Fame.

Since 1974, the PAS Composition Contest has encouraged the creation of hundreds of new works, many of which have become part of the standard percussion repertoire.

In 1979, the PAS Marching Percussion Committee appointed the PAS International Drum Rudiment Committee to act as the governing body in the revision and standardization of the 26 rudiments. A new listing of 40 International Drum Rudiments was adopted by PAS in 1984 and included drum corps, orchestral, European, and contemporary drum rudiments.

For its first two decades, the PAS office was located primarily in Terre Haute, Indiana. In 1981, the society's success and growth brought about the need to hire a staff to handle the society's its operations. So PAS rented office space in Urbana, Illinois, where then vice-president Tom Siwe was a teacher at the University of Illinois. In 1989, the society was informed that its office would no longer be available and a move was required. Through PAS board member Dr. James Lambert, the McMahon Foundation in Lawton, Oklahoma was solicited for possible support for the construction of a headquarters and museum facility in Lawton. Upon approval of the PAS Board of Directors and approval of a 2-for-1 matching grant for construction, PAS relocated and the Percussive Arts Society International Headquarters and Percussive Arts Museum were officially opened August 8, 1992. Instrument donations to the museum quickly used up all available display space, so an addition was constructed, adding another 4,000 square feet to the museum. The expanded museum reopened in August, 1995. Another addition to the building was completed in 2001.

During the early 1990s, in the early stages of the Internet, PAS was at the forefront of the emerging technology with the development of the World Percussion Network (WPN), a bulletin board system that allowed PAS members to share information via computer modems. With the development of the World Wide Web, PAS developed a Website (www.pas.org) that contained publication archives, research databases, a conference center, museum tour, and other features.

In 2005, after a nationwide search and formal proposal process, the PAS Board of Directors elected to relocate the headquarters, museum, and library to Indianapolis where, for the first time, PAS would be able to operate its headquarters, house its museum and library, and present its annual convention in the same city. PAS moved its operations in 2007, and the new museum with its now extensive collection of instruments from around the world and library of archives, scores, and recordings opened as Rhythm! Discovery Center in 2009 in Indianapolis.

Today, Percussive Arts Society has eighteen standing committees that address specific areas of percussion performance, research, education, pedagogy, and the percussion community. PAS committees play an essential role in advancing percussion through the development and dissemination of the latest information, research, and initiatives. In addition, PAS continues to support percussion education through a variety of chapter activities as well as through a number of scholarships. In addition to the annual Percussion Composition Contest, PAS has added Solo, Ensemble, World Music, and Marching Percussion contests that are held each year at PASIC.

The society maintains strategic partnerships with Drum Corp International (DCI), DrumsForCures:: DRUMSTRONG, Drum Circle Facilitators Guild, Music For All, Visit Indy and WGI Sport of the Arts (WGI). PAS is the world's largest percussion organization and is the central source for information and networking for percussionists and drummers of all ages.

he Outstanding PAS Service Award was established to recognize an individual each year that has provided service to the organization through a significant project,



cause, or cumulative service that has made a significant contribution to the Society as a whole. The 2017 recipient of the Outstanding PAS Service Award is **B. Michael Williams**. B. Michael Williams (b. 1954) recently retired as Professor of Music and Director of Percussion Studies at Winthrop University in Rock Hill, South Carolina. He holds the B.M. degree from Furman University, M.M. from Northwestern University, and Ph.D. from Michigan State University. Active as a performer and clinician in both symphonic and world music, Williams has performed with the Charlotte (NC) Symphony, Lansing (MI) Symphony, Brevard Music Center Festival Orchestra, and the Civic Orchestra of Chicago. He has written articles for Accent Magazine, South Carolina Musician, and Percussive Notes, and has made scholarly presentations on the music of John Cage and on African music at meetings of the College Music Society and Percussive Arts Society. In 2004, Dr. Williams received the Winthrop University Distinguished Professor Award, the highest honor given to a Winthrop faculty member.

Through the course of his tenure at Winthrop, he has published several acclaimed solo and ensemble compositions for percussion instruments from around the globe, including original works for frame drums from the Middle East and North Africa, solo djembe from West Africa, and Shona marimba music from Zimbabwe. His extensive study of the mbira dzavadzimu from Zimbabwe led to his development of a special tablaturestyle notation that depicts the intricate melodic, harmonic, and rhythmic interplay of the instrument in a logical and accessible presentation. His books and compositions are published by HoneyRock and Bachovich Music Publishers. He recently contributed a chapter in the Cambridge Companion to Percussion. In 2005, his recording BataMbira, with Grammy-nominated percussionist and producer Michael Spiro, was featured on National Public Radio, The Voice of America, and other broadcasts worldwide.

Williams has served as Associate Editor for World Percussion for *Percussive Notes* magazine since 2003 and has appeared at several Percussive Arts Society International Conventions. In 2012, the Winthrop University Percussion Ensemble won the Percussive Arts Society's World Percussion Ensemble Competition, earning them a showcase concert at the annual convention.

he Outstanding PAS Supporter Award was established to recognize an individual each year that has significantly promoted the Society through his or her professional and



educational activities to increase visibility and awareness of the Society. This year's recipient of the Outstanding PAS Supporter Award is Lauren Vogel Weiss. A longtime member of the organization, Lauren is attending her 40th consecutive PASIC in 2017. A prolific writer about the percussive arts, she has written 32 cover stories for Percussive Notes, including 22 Hall of Fame profiles. Her 300-plus articles have appeared in Drum Business, Drum Corps World, Modern Drummer, Modern Percussionist, Percussion News, Percussive Notes and Rhythm! Scene. Lauren served as Texas PAS Chapter President for almost two decades (1984-87 and 1991-2007), winning the Outstanding Chapter President Award twice (1992 and 2002). She also served the Society as a member of the Board of Directors and Chair of the PAS Marching Percussion Committee. Since 1979, Lauren has been a freelance percussionist in North Texas, playing with both the Dallas and Fort Worth Symphony Orchestras. She marched with the Phantom Regiment Drum & Bugle Corps from Rockford, Illinois during the 1980-1982 seasons and won DCI's "Outstanding Individual Keyboard" award in 1982. Lauren was Vice-President of Lone Star Percussion (1978-1990) and currently schedules percussion clinics and concerts through Percussion Events Registry Company.

The PAS President's Industry
Award was established to recognize those individuals in the Percussion Industry that have demonstrated outstanding achievement in their field and outstanding



support of the Society. The 2017 recipient of the PAS President's Industry Award is **Ron Samuels**. Ron Samuels is the owner and founder of Marimba One, in Arcata California. In the early Eighties, while studying piano at Humboldt State University, Ron first heard the marimba being played at a festival. Enthralled, yet living on a student budget, he decided to build his own marimba. Without formal training in either woodworking or manufacturing, Ron dedicated his life to designing and building marimbas.

After five years of experimentation under his belt, he exhibited some of his first attempts at concert marimbas at the 1988 PASIC in San Antonio, Texas. These instruments were highly unusual and non-traditional. He came home with several pages (of much needed) suggested improvements recommended by the many percussionists at PASIC. At the following PASIC in 1989, in Nashville Tennessee, he brought new instruments updated with all of the comments and criticism from the previous year. This time his list of suggestions was only a half-page long. And so it began!

The Philadelphia PASIC in 1990 was a turning point. Ron's marimbas started to become accepted as legitimate concert marimbas. His best teachers on how to build marimbas have always been the marimba players, the musicians. Ron's job has ultimately been to translate musician's comments about what they would ideally like a marimba to be into the engineering and acoustics of a Marimba One instrument. The Marimba One team passionately strives to continually make the best instruments possible.

Marimba One's factory is located in the small northern California town of Arcata where 100% of the design, engineering, and manufacturing take place.

This award replaces and enhances the PAS Outstanding Chapter President Award, which was an annual award presented on behalf of the Society for nineteen years to an Outstanding Chapter President. Knowing that an outstanding chapter president's contributions are really the reflection of the work of the other chapter officers as well as the chapter membership, the Outstanding Chapter Award was integrated into the Society's awards in 2010. The 2017 Outstanding PAS Chapter Award goes to the Brazil Chapter. Currently, Ronni Kot Wenzell is serving as Interim President.

ers in percussion education. The recipient of this award for 2017 is **Richard Gipson**. Richard C. Gipson serves as Director of the Texas Christian University (TCU) School of Music, a position he has held since 2002. He

continues to teach percussion and regularly conducts the TCU Percussion Orchestra and Ensembles. Prior to his TCU appointment, he served for 26 years as Professor of Percussion on the faculty of the University of Oklahoma School of Music, where at times he also held several administrative positions, including Director of the School of Music, Executive Assistant to the President, and Interim Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs. Professor Gipson performed as timpanist and percussionist for more than 30 years with the Oklahoma City Philharmonic, the Oklahoma Symphony, and the Austin and Corpus Christi Symphony Orchestras.

He holds a doctorate from Penn State University, and undergraduate and Master's degrees from the University of Texas. In addition to TCU and OU, he taught percussion at the University of Texas, Central Missouri State University, Susquehanna University, and Penn State University. His more than 30 original compositions and special arrangements for marimba and percussion ensemble are published by Southern Music Company, Studio 4 Productions, Columbia Pictures Publications, and the OU Percussion Press, and his four commercial compact disc recordings with the OU Percussion Orchestra helped set the standard for performance and recording in that genre. He commissioned and/or premiered more than three dozen works for percussion orchestra and ensemble, including some of the now iconic works for percussion. While he was at OU, the OU Percussion Orchestra was competitively selected to perform at PASIC in 1985, 1990, 1995, and

Hidden Treasures: Percussion Music You Haven't Heard

Since roughly 1915, percussion instruments have been used more and more extensively in solo and ensemble contexts. Works by John Cage and Steve Reich, among other composers, are very important and could be said to constitute part of our ever-growing canon. However, because percussion does not have the long history that an instrument such as the piano or violin has, a "standard" repertory is still in the process of being established.

Currently, there are hundreds of new works for percussion being composed every year, many of which, for one reason or another, are performed once or possibly never. The New Music / Research Committee is seeking pieces that deserve a wider audience—previously overlooked pieces that members of our society believe should be considered as additions to our still young standard repertory.

For example, in 1951 Karlheinz Stockhausen stated "from now on, I will accept only Karel Goeyvaerts as my teacher in composition." However, Goeyvaerts' works for percussion ensemble from the 1980s, *Litany II* and *Instant 0 X 0*, both composed for Percussion Group Cincinnati, are rarely performed.

To give our members a bit of perspective, it should be noted that John Cage's seminal *Third Construction* is actually a relatively recent addition to our current repertoire. Performances beginning in the 1970s (roughly thirty years after its date of composition) by the Blackearth Percussion Group, Nexus, and others helped give this (at the time) "hidden treasure" a fresh and well-deserved second look.

Proposals should be limited to solo and ensemble works for percussion without other instruments. Works from any era will be considered, with special consideration given to unpublished works and pieces by emerging or little-known composers. Bodies of work will also be given special consideration, for example works from the repertoire of one performer or group of performers, as well as works by one composer. Because the definition of what constitutes a "hidden treasure" is rather broad, the Committee encourages a wide range of applications.

Proposals should clearly describe how the work in question relates to the overall Focus Day theme.

As always, the Committee is interested in the participation of both emerging and established artists, and applications from performers, composers, scholars, and ensembles are encouraged. All proposals that meet the criteria and qualify for inclusion on Focus Day performances will be given complete and careful consideration. Please note that all expenses, as well as the securing of instruments and funding sources, will be the sole responsibility of the artist(s) themselves. This includes all logistical and financial considerations associated with the performance. Please prepare and submit your proposal with this consideration in mind.

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
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
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


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
